FFC is going nut-free

From celebrations to Connect Groups, our congregation shares in prayer, laughter and food.

Franklin Federated Church prides itself on being an inclusive congregation, but we've come to learn that some people have been inherently excluded without us even realizing it. People, including a member of my own family, cannot fully integrate into our church family due to severe food allergies and the risks presented at our gatherings.

Food allergies have been a hot topic in recent years. Food allergies in children have increased 50% between 1997 and 2011, affecting an estimated 4 million children in the United States.

Peanuts have become the most common cause of food-related death. Even a small trace amount of the allergen can cause a severe reaction, anaphylaxis, that may require quick use of an EpiPen and/or an emergency room visit.

To mitigate this risk, schools across the country have begun implementing peanut- and tree-nut-free classrooms and lunch tables.

The world is certainly changing and once again FFC is preparing to change with it. Starting on Easter Sunday, food at Franklin Federated Church gatherings will be nut-free.



WE NEED YOUR HELP!

When bringing food for FFC activities such as coffee hour, luncheons, and other church celebrations ensure they are PEANUT AND TREE-NUT FREE.

You can do this by checking labels for statements such as "may contain/contains peanuts or tree nuts" and "manufactured in a facility that processes peanuts and tree nuts". Many baked-goods manufacturers feature a "Peanut Free Facility" symbol on the front of their containers.

When preparing foods at home, please wash your hands and cooking surfaces with soap and water. Hand sanitizers do not wash

away the peanut oil that can be left behind by peanut products.

FEELING OVERWHELMED?

When I was first introduced to my daughter's allergy I was overwhelmed by all of the information out on the Internet — all the risks and consequences if I got it wrong.

What I found is that my favorite brands have substitutes. Some examples: for cakes, I typically grabbed Betty Crocker cake mix, but now I use Pillsbury. Peanut butter recipes can be substituted with Sun Butter, made from sunflower seeds.

It does take a little time to adjust and I appreciate all of you for taking the time to protect my child, and any others who have life-threatening food allergies.

Affirmands prepare for CityReach

The FFC Affirmands will participate in a retreat through CityReach, an overnight urban outreach program in Boston, Friday, April 28th. CityReach is a program of common cathedral.

Our program starts on a Friday evening when we will be addressed by staff who are experiencing, or have experienced, homelessness. We will walk through the city guided by members of common cathedral and end the evening with a simple worship service. We will sleep on the floor of a Boston church.

On Saturday morning we will offer the clothing, gear and toiletries we have collected, along with a small meal to guests who come to "shop" among the donated items. Some of us may return to the street, taking sandwiches and clothes to people at South Station, Copley Square, or Boston's waterfront.

Then, we will eat lunch and reflect about the experience in light of the Gospel. We will write a prayer, and talk about our next steps.

If FFC attendees and members have any gently used items (listed on page 3), or if you would like to contribute a new item to this ministry, they can be left in the Parlor at FFC or contact an affirmand.

AFFIRMANDS

Items requested for Affirmands' CityReach trip

The 2017 Affirmation Class is collecting items in anticipation of their mission trip to Boston's CityReach on April 28-29th.

Our collection is ongoing through April 23rd, a few days before heading to Boston. We would prefer to receive items sooner than later to make preparations easier.

We need to collect three types of items: new items, used items, and food items.

CLOTHING AND OTHER ITEMS NEEDED FROM ALL GROUPS FOR DISTRIBUTION TO GUESTS:

Please think about what you would wear camping or hiking. Such comfortable, rugged clothing is just what is needed.

Also, we will have about four times the number of male guests as female guests, so about 80% of what you bring should be for men or unisex. Large sizes (XL, XXL, and XXXL) are very much in demand. Hooded sweatshirts and sweat pants are much appreciated.

NEW ITEMS

» Travel-size toiletries such as soap, shampoo, deodorant, lotion, Chapstick, toothpaste, and shaving cream in small sizes, as well as tooth brushes and disposable razors, and tampons (no aftershave or mouthwash containing alcohol).

- » New white socks (there can never be too many of these)
- » New underwear (again, there can never be too many and be sure to bring 80% of the underwear for men. All sizes, from small to XL needed.)

USED ITEMS AND CLOTHING, CLEAN, IN GOOD CONDITION

- » All kinds of carrying cases such as backpacks, tote bags, fanny packs, small suitcases with wheels
- » Sleeping bags & blankets
- » Nylon jackets and pants, ponchos, and raincoats in Spring & Fall
- » Warm coats in Winter
- » Sweatshirts and sweatpants (especially hooded sweatshirts)
- » Sweaters
- » T-shirts
- » Long-sleeve shirts
- » Jeans, khakis and other casual pants (80% for men)
- » Waterproof boots, comfortable shoes, and sneakers
- » Hats, waterproof gloves
- » Belts

FOOD ITEMS

- » Enough snacks and caffeine-free soda/juice for sharing on Friday night
- » Bread and filling to make enough sandwiches for 4 times the number in your group, (4x12=48). Suggested fillings include peanut

- butter and jelly or fluff, cold cuts, tuna fish, egg salad, and cheese.
- Cookies, brownies, soft granola bars or other individually packaged snacks for 3 times the number in your group (36).
 Hard boiled eggs and fruit that is easy to chew (oranges, bananas, grapes, but not apples) are also appreciated.
- » 2 boxes of cereal for breakfast. Individual packets of oatmeal are also welcomed.
- » 1 gallon of milk (1 or 2 percent)
- » Gallon bottles of juice
- » 1 large size can of coffee
- » 1 tub of hot chocolate mix with NO marshmallows (the kind to which water is added — about the same size as a large can of coffee); not individual packets
- » 1 package of extra-large (60 gal) garbage bags
- » Approximately 100 hot cups + 100 cold cups
- » 1 roll of paper towel, one sponge, dish soap
- » 100 sandwich bags
- » Plastic/paper/shopping bags for guests to carry away the clothes they receive

Spring collection underway for CWS hygiene kits

We will be collecting Hygiene Kits for Church World Service. CWS distributes these kits around the world whenever and wherever a natural disaster strikes. We will be delivering the kits to Plymouth Church in Framingham the beginning of May.

We collected 32 kits during Fall 2016, with a combined Fall/Spring goal of 100 kits total. That leaves us 68 more to go for our spring drive.

Please place your finished kits in the basket in the narthex. The last day for the spring collection is April 30th. Missions would like to thank you for your support each and every year.

The following items should be placed in a one-gallon plastic bag with zipper closure:

- » One hand towel measuring approximately 16" x 28" (no fingertip or bath towels)
- » One washcloth
- » One wide-tooth comb removed from the package
- » One fingernail or toenail clipper removed from package (no metal files or emery boards)
- » One bar of soap (bath size in wrapper)
- » One toothbrush (in original packaging)
- » Ten standard size Band-Aids®
- » \$2 cash for shipping costs

Please do NOT add toothpaste to the hygiene kit. Toothpaste with an extended shelf date will be added to the kit just prior to shipping. — Deb Stiffler

The answer: Leader Don Goddard has high standards for courtesy and fair play. The group has received good-natured coaching in taking turns and is encouraged to speak loudly enough so that all can hear. Don opens each gathering with carefully chosen prayer, and then encourages members' prayer requests before sharing a bit of wisdom from the ages. Then, it's on to the discussion with plenty of fun and laughter and interesting sharing of ideas and opinion.

Newest Book Group member Deb Cormay selected *The Soldiers Wife*, the group's current read, set during WWII in Deb's native and beloved Guernsey Island, situated in the English Channel off the coast of Normandy. Her accounts of the island and artifacts she has shared add a fascinating dimension to the reading.

Books are generally read over the course of several weeks. "Take-Away Tuesday" marks the completion of each book, and at that time a round-robin procedure allows each person to share a personal "take-away" — a



connection with life or another book, an unresolved question, a new understanding or reflection on life. Then, it's on to the next book with equal enthusiasm.

Check out the slide announcements each Sunday morning before worship where the group's current book title and the week's reading assignment is projected onto the wall. The information is repeated in the Staying Connected flyer in the bulletin each Sunday.

The next semester of Connect Groups will be here before we know it. Perhaps you will consider being part of this unique and popular reading experience.

RESTORATION CAMPAIGN

Restoration Update

We are in year two of the Restoration campaign, and looking back, we've hit some major, tangible milestones.

However, as much as we have to celebrate, we are pivoting to even more opportunities in the near future.

During 2017, we've set our sights on the following projects:

First up, **Fire protection**. We have three stages to this: getting a survey (done), making fire protection plans, and implementation. We are in stage two. We have estimates on fire protection plans from two companies, and plan on hiring one in the coming months. Once those plans are created, we move to the third phase: installation, likely in 2018.

Next up, **Electrical**. You may recall that we already replaced and

grounded the main electrical panel and several sub-panels. We have one more to go. Along with that work, we will be asking our electrician to do a complete inspection of all wiring in the church building.

Third, water intrusion. We will be soliciting advice and estimates from roofing companies to identify the roof leaks and make repairs.

Fourth, we're looking at **parking lot repairs**, which involve the possible re-paving of the full lot and driveways.

Fifth, after heating season is done, we will be replacing the **parsonage boiler**, which is at the end of its useful life.

Sixth, whenever we are graced with nicer weather, we will be making needed repairs to the current **wheelchair-access ramp**.

A seventh project, recently added to the list, is addressing the **sinking stairs** leading to the basement hallways.

Moving from projects to everyone's favorite topic, finances. People have pledged about \$504,000. We have spent about \$162,000, including \$10,000 to New Hope. We have about \$158,000 in the bank, plus about \$25,000 of stocks, as working capital to tackle upcoming projects.

All of these improvements are made possible through your generous giving to the Restoration Campaign. On behalf of everyone on the Restoration Campaign committee, thank you for your ongoing support.
